

Toronto Captures 7th Annual Inter-City Hockey Competition

Toronto employees captured the annual two game home-and-home hockey series at the Montreal Forum, Saturday, March 9 by defeating the Montreal club 6-2. It was Montreal's second defeat by Toronto which finalized the total point series: Toronto 13, Montreal 2. Toronto came to Montreal with a 7 goal lead following the game in Toronto, January 26 when Toronto shut out the Montreal squad 7-0.

The game in Montreal got under way with both teams displaying fast skating and impressive stick-handling. Dave Barnes of the Toronto club drew the initial penalty in the first period. Shortly after his return to the ice Barnes assisted Ken Ewens in slapping the puck across the Montreal goal line for Toronto's first score. It was then an all-out attack by the Montreal squad with Leo Paris recording Montreal's first goal assisted by Erny Samson. Montreal's Ron Korchynski levelled off the penalty

roster for the period which gave Ken Ewens an opportunity to score Toronto's second goal while Montreal was short-handed. Ken McLeod of Toronto assisted Ewens with his second score of the game.

Early in the second period Doug Pride assisted by Leo Paris scored Montreal's second goal to equal the tally. At this point the only double penalty of the game was handed out to Jean Deschambault of Montreal and Dean McKinnon of Toronto. The final goal of the second period was scored by Toronto's Chuck Taylor assisted by Ken McLeod and Ken Ewens.

During the second half of the third period the Toronto team scored three quick goals behind Montreal net-minder Larry Courville to end the scoring. Toronto's three goals in the third were by Taylor assisted by Waddy Coupland and Charley Lennox; Bob Philips from Coupland and Bill Gallant; Coupland from

Dick Thompson and Charley Lennox. The final penalty of the game was given to Toronto's Bill Gallant.

An estimated 300 relatives, friends and employees from Montreal and Toronto watched the game plus the presentation of the TCA Public Relations Trophy. The trophy was presented to Charlie Lennox of the Toronto team by Mike Hildred,

Area Manager, Public Relations while Fred Armstrong, Coach and Doug Coakwell, Manager, both of Toronto, witnessed the event.

Following the game, a reception was held for more presentations at the Skyline Hotel. Most valuable defense trophy was presented to Charlie Lennox of Toronto by W. D. (Pat) Patterson, Cargo Sales Manager, Toronto. Most valuable player trophy awarded annually by Corby's Distillery was presented to Ken Ewens of Toronto, and Herb Archambault of Corby's again made the presentation.

A new trophy, "They Also Ran", showing a skunk rampant under a four-columned canopy, topped by a figure of a hockey player, was presented by Ken Dutton, formerly of the Skyline Hotel in Toronto and Manager of the Skyline Hotel in Montreal. Rick Schofield, backed up by Montreal coach, Claude Nadeau, who was responsible for all the arrangements of the day, accepted the trophy.
